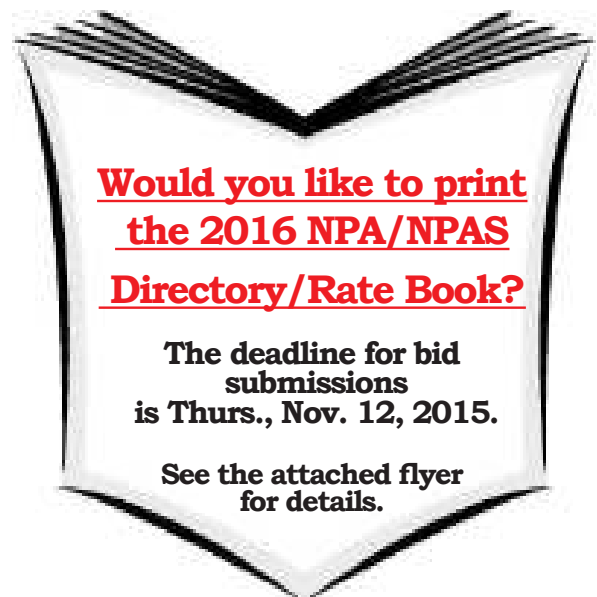
The award recognizes individuals, organizations or media outlets that contribute significantly to the development of good citizenship, voter education and voter turnout.

Broken Bow Custer County Chief names new publisher

With over 20 years of publishing experience, Bill Parsons has been named publisher of the *Broken Bow Custer County Chief*, starting October 26. Interim publisher, Harlan Beagley served as the Chief's publisher during the last few months and shared his time with other newspapers in different states as a group publisher.

Prior to joining the Chief, Parsons served four-plus years at *Parsons Publications* out of Elizabethtown, TN, where he developed and marketed a number of special sections.

He worked in Waynesville, NC, with *Mountaineer Publishing* as operations and sales director, working primarily for two community newspapers. Other publishing posts included those in VA, IN, CA and WY. He started his career as a crew sales manager for the *Tampa Tribune* (FL).

According to an article that published in the Chief in October, Parsons' ideology focuses on the need of a newspaper to serve its readers before anything else. "I have always believed that if a newspaper does not serve its communities, it has no reason to exist," Parsons said. "The Chief has served the people of Custer County and Central Nebraska well during its long history. I look forward to being part of the team that continues that tradition." His foremost goal is to continue providing quality content for the readers.

A graduate of East Tennessee State University, Parsons has been very involved in civic and community activities, was a member of press associations in NC, TN, CA, WY and VA, and served as a board member for the VA and IN press associations.

NNA announces workshop for printers that mail newspapers

National Newspaper Association (NNA) November 2, 2015

The complexities of managing Periodicals newspapers in the mail have ballooned in the past decade as consolidated printing operations and the digital tools of the U.S. Postal Service have reshaped the industry. **The National Newspaper Association announces its first-ever workshop for Periodicals printers, set for March 16, 2016, at the Crystal City Marriott in Arlington VA.**

NNA President Chip Hutcheson, publisher of The Times Leader in Princeton, KY, said NNA realized that solving the multiple challenges of newspaper delivery in the mail required better training for printers.

"The days are gone where each publisher had his own backshop, sacked his newspapers and hauled them to the post office," he said. "Now, a qualified Periodicals printer is probably a regional company and it has to have experts on Intelligent Mail Barcodes, electronic Documentation or 'e-Doc,' and a plethora of mail preparation details, such as use of flats trays. NNA is beginning this training program so we can nail down some best practices."

The program and registration details will be announced in December.

NNA Postal Committee Chair Max Heath urged publishers to contact their printers now to ask them to save the date.

"NNA has engaged since summer 2015 with USPS in mail service improvement programs called 'Kaizens,' where high-level USPS operations executives focus intensely on one newspaper to figure out where and why the breakdowns in service outside the local destination post office are occurring. We have learned a lot from the half-dozen we have done. Some of the problems we have are in the Postal Service and some, quite frankly, are in our own operations. Container and bundle preparation are two areas where opportunity for improvement exists. We need to teach printers about origin-mixed mail, how to get signed up for e-Doc and what to do when USPS is ready to begin electronic tracking of bundles," he said.

NNA provides regular instruction by Heath at annual conventions and in Publishers' Auxiliary. The new workshop recognizes that sometimes, training publishers is not enough.

"We need our printers to get up to speed quickly," Hutcheson said. "Most of the information they need is available through NNA. But we are going to make it easier to use and create opportunities for printers to talk directly with USPS operations experts. Who should attend? Printers, for sure. But also anyone who is being driven nuts by the telephone ringing with subscribers complaining that they're not getting their newspaper in the mailbox on time. We are going to roll up our sleeves and tackle these issues one by one."

There's a reason I love my work so much. There's a reason that there are folks around the country waiting for me to return their calls while I'm writing this column. They can wait. This is more important. I love my work for the same reason many of you do. I've got something important to share and it can't wait while I make phone calls.

In my opinion, "Awesome" is the most overused word in the English language. I cringe when I hear it, and as the father of two teenagers, I hear it a lot. So I got out the dusty thesaurus and found a synonym that would work: phenomenal. That's the best word I know of to describe the trip I just took to Minnesota. Yes, that's right, Minnesota.

I've worked with more than 100 papers in Minnesota this year. I know, that's a lot of

papers. And there is something that's very apparent as I crisscross the frozen tundra (OK, tundra might be a stretch) of Minnesota, visiting papers from McGregor to Pipestone to Preston: newspapers in Minnesota are doing really well. That truth was never more apparent to me than in late October, when I visited papers in the central and western areas of the state.

I've got John Stone to thank for the visit. John manages Quinco Press in Lowry, a small town in West-Central Minnesota. I've visited Quinco a few times since 1997, and my official reason for traveling to Lowry in October was to do an afternoon of training for area newspaper staffs, then a day of press tests on Quinco's new press.

Following the afternoon of training on day one, I had the real pleasure of having dinner with John and his wife Mary, along with Reed and Shelly Anfinson, old friends who run

weekly papers not too far from Lowry. I had just seen Shelly a week earlier at The Institute of Newspaper Technology in my hometown of Knoxville, Tennessee.

We discussed the plight of the newspaper industry, with more and more newspapers being bought, only to be closed by large corporations. I did as I sometimes do in such situations, realizing I was becoming way too excited about the subject.

I loved it when Reed looked at me from his end of the table and said, "Keep going. You're preaching to the choir here."

Most Minnesota newspapers, it seems, aren't owned by far-away corporations. They're owned and operated right in the towns where they're located, or within a few miles. And unlike newspapers in some areas, most aren't suffering from staggering circulation declines and disappearing profits. The more than 400 newspapers in Minnesota are doing something right, and I'm starting to understand what that is.

On the evening of day two, I found myself in Sauk Centre, a thriving town two hours north of the Twin Cities. Dave Simpkins, recognized nationally for his phenomenal success, had invited me to spend a day with his staff. But first, he invited me, along with a few other folks, to dinner. As we sat at our table, a young man in an electric cart drove up. Having several friends with cerebral palsy, I immediately knew that was the reason he was in the cart.

Dave introduced me to Mike Imeike and I quickly learned that he is in charge of tear-sheeting at the Sauk Centre Herald.

It's difficult for many folks to understand someone with cerebral palsy when they speak, but I had no problem understanding Mike when he quickly volunteered, "Dave called me on the phone ten years ago. He said, 'I've got a job for you. Come down to the paper.'"

Mike did as instructed and has been in charge of tear-sheeting in Sauk Centre for ten years. It's obvious the rest of the staff loves working with him and Mike, Dave tells me, is a great employee.

I compare stories like that with the trend of large groups to buy newspapers, cut staffs to bare minimum, then watch their circulation and profits deteriorate.

Dave Simpkins has a good heart. Of that, there is no doubt. But he also knows something about running successful newspapers.

I'm sorry that most folks don't have the luxury of visiting places like Sauk Centre, McGregor and Pipestone. These are places where newspapers are valuable assets to their communities, where writers, editors and designers feel a part of something greater, and where the future continues to look bright.

As Dave Simpkins and I had breakfast at a local cafe in Sauk Centre to begin day three, I noticed the love and respect that was shared between him and everyone we encountered.

When Dave introduced me to a group of six folks and told them I was there to improve their newspaper, one man quickly spoke up, "Don't do anything to mess up our paper. We love it."

So do I.

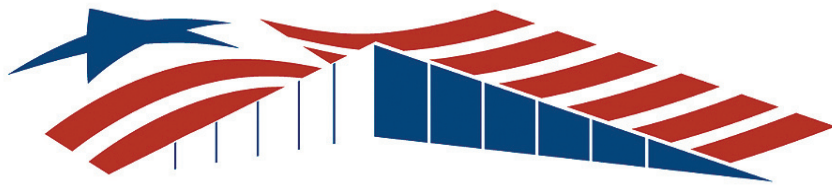
